COLLIERSTOWN HAS A BUSY SPRING!

March blew into Collierstown in a hurry and with it came much activity! A 4 cents a meal offering was taken by the Collierstown congregation each Sunday of the month during the worship service offertory to begin raising funds for the 2024 RISE AGAINST HUNGER (formerly STOP HUNGER NOW) MEAL PACKING DAY sponsored by the community's six churches. The event is held every other year with funds being raised to purchase food supplies for packing during the alternate year. The PW's Night Circle group joined in the effort and a total of \$745.80 was raised to begin the '24 campaign.

In April under the leadership of PW member Rosalea Potter, an Effinger Community Easter Egg Hunt was held on Saturday, April 8 in the field across from the Effinger Volunteer Fire Department with 70 children hunting eggs and 30 parents and volunteers assisting with the morning's activities. The congregations of the Collierstown Presbyterian, Collierstown United Methodist, Mt. Horeb United Methodist, Oxford Presbyterian, and Union View Advent Christian Church worked together providing games, activities, and treats for the children in attendance. Support from the Effinger Ruritan Club was also received to provide a free photo opportunity for children with the Easter Bunny.

Sunday, April 16 was a day of celebration, thanksgiving, and hospitality as nine children in

the church family were baptized and seven adults were welcomed as members of Collierstown Presbyterian Church. Rev. Bill Klein led the 11:00 a.m. worship service and administered the sacrament of baptism. He also presided over the commitment to church membership made by the seven adults. Following the worship hour, a reception and time of fellowship was held in the Fellowship Hall by the Presbyterian Women for the one hundred and fifty members, family, and friends in attendance. It was a day of joy and thanksgiving as adults professed their faith in Jesus Christ and committed to serve Him as church members. It was also a time of celebration as the members of the congregation joined with the parents of the children baptized committing to encourage and nurture these children as they grow in Christian faith. The children ranged in age from six months to four years and all had the benefit of a faith legacy spanning at least five generations. The heritage of faith is always an asset in bringing others to Christ as was witnessed that day!

The Presbyterian Women held its spring meeting on Thursday, April 20. Plans for the PW's birthday celebration were announced with the annual birthday offering being received on Mother's Day, May 14. Plans were also made to recognize the congregation's four Rockbridge County High School seniors on Sunday, May 21. Each will receive an ESV Study Bible engraved with their name and their achievement will be celebrated with Lemonade on the Lawn at the conclusion of the morning worship service. In addition to other business relating to spring and summer activities the group approved holding its Annual Church Dinner on Saturday, November 4. The Annual Church Dinner is sponsored by the PW but is a total church undertaking. It has been a source of fellowship and outreach for the church family since 1925 when the first Chrvsanthemum Show and Dinner was held. We look forward to welcoming our community and friends to enjoy delicious food and hospitality at Collierstown Presbyterian Church. Be sure to save the date!

As we move into May our two PW Circle Bible Study groups are closing an exciting year of study. The C & F Circle had eight women studying "Celebrating Sabbath" by Rev. Dr. Carol Bechtel and the Night Circle has had seventeen women engaged in "Sabbath-The Gift of Rest" by Rev. Dr. Lynne Baab. Both groups have embraced the Sabbath and have found this gift and the understanding we now have, to be life changing.

SOMETHING NEW DURING LENT AND EASTER

During the Lenten season I asked the Session if we could do something a little different. Each Sunday during Lent, we had a shiort reading and then extinguished a candle to commemorate the pathway of our Lord to the cross. There were six candles representing the six weeks of Lent and the white Christ Candle. During the forty days of Lent the Christian Church prepares to observe the Lord's passion and resurrection. We examine ourselves as we remember the suffering and sacrifice of Jesus on our behalf. In this season of repentance and fasting, we come to terms with our mortality and need for God's mercy. The candles represent Jesus' life and ministry. Each week we extinguished a candle, remembering how we, the human race, rejected Jesus Christ, the light of the world.

At our combined Maundy Thursday/Good Friday service we extinguished the final candle. The candle that represented the light of Christ in the world. On Easter Sunday, the candles were once again lit for Christ is alive and His light surrounds us.

Lent represents not only Christ's walk to the cross but our presence beside him. Walking that path is not meant to be easy just as being a Christian is not easy. Year round our PW provides and packages applesauce (monthly) to the Meals on Wheels program in our community.

NEW EVERY MORNING READ LAMENTATIONS 3:22-24

Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt so that you may know how to answer everyone. Colossians 4:6

Few people enjoy a "habitual complainer" or a person who seems to dwell on gloom and doom. Neither do we appreciate a constant "Pollyanna" or "pie-in-the-sky type who never seem to be sympathetic or understanding when others attempt to share their tough, challenging and sad experiences. In fact, a glib reply or cliché to a heartfelt expression of concern or sorrow can sometimes feel like a slap in the face or a splash of cold water to that person who needs warm comfort and a listening ear.

It seems we need a balance of emotional responses to others, and a realistic view of our own lives as well as the circumstances of others . In Colossians 4:6 Apostle Paul reminded his readers to always let their conversation be full of grace and seasoned with salt, so they knew how to answer everyone. A friend once reminded our Bible Study group that a homemade cake needs very little salt for flavor, but a ham may need a larger amount for preservation. The same may be said of our responses to others in different situations. Sometimes gentleness is needed and sometimes firmness and strength.

The prophet Jeremiah certainly had a very realistic view of the plight of Israel in the book of Lamentations. His words were seasoned with salt throughout the book. He captured the truth of their situation, yet reminded his readers that we are never without the presence and love of God who gives us His glimmers of light and hope. His compassions fail not and are new every morning.

We thank you for the mercy, compassion and faithfulness that you give to us. Help us to remember that every person in our lives is your child and also needs your mercy, compassion and faithfulness from us. Amen.
