Friends, we are in Lent, and at the end of this month, will celebrate Easter.

Lent is a journey to the cross.

And during Lent, many congregations use a large cross, with a cloth lying over the cross bars, as a central visual prompt to remind us of that journey and that sacrifice.

But then, on Easter morning, many churches decorate the cross is with flowers—some congregations even have the worship activity of having congregations members come forward during Easter morning worship to attach flowers to the cross.

And what was brown and barren, an instrument of torture and suffering, is now bursting with new life.

But one of the things we might forget is that those flowers, long before Easter morning, have been at work, under the soil, seeds sprouting, roots digging deep into the earth...all unseen.

I have been experiencing some of that recently in my ministry with the congregations of Shenandoah Presbytery—new life, bursting into joyous blooms and beginnings, after 3 or 4 years (depending on how you count it) from the first restrictions due to Covid, or from years of decline, or aging and weariness.

New things are happening, congregations are stepping out in faith to try things, our New Worshipping Community at Community Cup is growing.

And all these things, like the flowers we might put on the cross, began...

Long before that moment of "new life."

Began in prayer, began in darkness, unseen, began in the Holy Spirit's stirring of hearts and minds, of saying "I wonder" or "what if.." or "Maybe we could..."

Easter is about new beginnings, is about God's triumph over sin and death.

What new things are already beginning to grow and sprout in you and your congregation?

How can you help them come to blossom and bear fruit?

How can the Presbytery support you in this?

Boundary Training

In 2023, the Presbyterian Church (USA) created new guidelines for councils (Sessions, Presbyteries, and Synods, as well as the General Assembly itself). These guidelines require Boundary Training for all people serving on those councils, and must include specific content on Child Sexual Abuse Prevention and Sexual Misconduct Prevention. This training must be completed at least every thirty-six months. The same requirement applies to those who are Certified Christian Educators, and those under care of the Presbytery as Inquirers.

While the Presbytery has always mandated Boundary Training for those in pastoral leadership, and for those going on Presbytery sponsored mission trips, this addition of other categories of people is relatively new.

And you have responded overwhelmingly. So much so, that we have had to cap registration for each training. Thank you for your faithfulness, and your understanding that this training will make us a healthier church.

Please also watch for future trainings, some of which will be in person (I am available to come to your Session, or meet with groups of Sessions at a central location), and some of which will be via zoom.

More days and times (including weekdays) will be offered in May and June. Look for information about these training courses to come.

Anniversary Celebrations!

At the February 27 Stated Meeting, Shenandoah Presbytery celebrated its 200th meeting. To mark this milestone, mission gifts of \$200 were sent to each congregation, to be able to engage in a new mission, or expand an already existing one. We look forward to hearing the reports of this celebration endeavor in the February 2025 Presbytery meeting.

But, have another anniversary celebration this year. Shenandoah Presbytery is 50 years old! (well, that's young, really, by Presbyterian standards).

Begun in a move to restructure Presbytery boundaries by the General Assembly, in 1972 conversations between Winchester Presbytery and Lexington Presbytery were begun. Shenandoah Presbytery was officially established in 1974. We are 50 years old!

Now, 50 year anniversaries are, in popular culture, "golden" anniversaries. Some of that "gold" has already been shared as the mission starters, distributed at the February meeting.

Plans are being made for an in-person anniversary celebration, at the Saturday, September 14 Big Event and Presbytery meeting, to be held in person at Massanetta Springs.

In the morning, we will meet as the Big Event, with Rev. Dr. Jacqueline Lapsley, President of Union Presbyterian Seminary, as preacher and keynote speaker. There will be short workshops that morning, to serve in part as the "educational hour" for the Presbytery.

After lunch in the Massanetta Springs dining hall, the Presbytery will convene for its meeting. It will be a time of necessary business, but also of celebration for 50 years of God's presence in our ministries.

Here is a portion of the original 1974 Shenandoah Presbytery Mission Statement:

"Therefore, with glad and joyful hearts, we covenant together to be the Presbytery of Shenandoah; to be faithful in searching for the will of God as we listen to the Word, the church and the world; to depend upon the presence and power of the Holy Spirit; to offer always our daily life for His judgement and healing, that we may live together as His covenant people and look to the future to which He is calling us. We gratefully remember He has given us each other, the church and the world as a sacred trust and gift."

We look forward to giving God all the glory, and to the next 50 years of ministry and service!

Community Cup Coffee and More

Greetings from Community Cup Coffee and More at 114 West Burke Street in Martinsburg West Virginia. It is a blessing to be a New Worshiping Community in West Virginia for the Presbytery of Shenandoah. I hope that some of you will take time to make a stop in the shop to get some coffee and food Monday through Friday 8am-4pm or Saturday 8am-8pm. In addition, I would like to formally invite you to attend, or lead, our worship services on Friday nights at 7pm. We recently moved our worship time and day to accommodate Recovery Church Martinsburg's Saturday worship at 7pm that was taking place at the same time as our previous day and time.

We are seeking to provide a place to be sober and welcome on two weekend nights for people in recovery. We celebrate communion every week, have informal dress, worship from the shop tables circled up around a communion table. Music is lead with a guitar or hammer dulcimer and we use a screen to display the Scripture and on occasion we use liturgy. We practice Lectio Divina each week for discussion and immersion in the Scriptures.

During the month of February, we have celebrated 5 baptisms and welcomed into our membership these first five members. We got to host Ash Wednesday services with Tuscarora, Gerrardstown, and Tabler Presbyterian Churches and had a near capacity number of people (for us that's 49) in attendance.

It appears that God's Spirit is moving and guiding us into the ministry to which we are being called in Martinsburg. We need additional church partners and additional volunteers to help spread out the work and gain a broader range of gifts in service to God's Realm. We currently partner with Tuscarora and Shepherdstown Presbyterian Churches. We need board members that represent even more congregations in the Presbytery to serve at a weekly meeting at 2pm on Mondays that meets at Tuscarora Presbyterian, (but could rotate locations based on where volunteers are from if needed). This board serves as advisory committee to the shop and the church. Please ask your Ruling Elders, Deacons, or ANY lay people who would like to give to a ministry with those in poverty and those in recovery to come and serve.

We also need people who are willing to come and lead (worship-clergy people in particular) who would like to preach; the sermons we have are usually 5-10 minutes so more of what we might call a "meditation". We also welcome anyone who may want to come and help set up communion, arrange tables, read Scriptures or lead music, and help clean up afterward. The more people from the Presbytery we have involved, the better. The more congregations we are able to partner with, the better. Thanks for considering this way of serving God through the Community Cup Coffee and More New Worshiping Community. If you feel led by the Holy Spirit to give to unhoused people, people who are vulnerable because of addiction, and people who are on the margins of society, please contact me (Dwight McCormick) 937-244-6769 or communitycup 114@gmail.com to tell me when and how you'd like to volunteer.

If you are unable to volunteer, please do pray for the ministry and ask that God will reveals God's will and give us the power to carry out Divine will. Thank you.

Host an International Peacemaker this Fall!

Would you be interested in hosting an International Peacemaker at your church or in your community this Fall? If so, the presbytery needs to hear from you!

The International Peacemaker visits are part of the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program, which is funded by the PC (USA)'s annual Peace and Global Witness Offering. From September 13th – October 7th, 2024, at least 11 peacemakers from partner denominations and organizations around the world will be visiting presbyteries to share about their ministries and interpret issues of peace and justice.

Last Fall, Shenandoah Presbytery welcomed Noemí Sánchez of El Salvador. She spoke during worship at Massanutten Presbyterian Church (<u>click here for video</u>) and did much more during her trip to the Valley.



Massanutten Presbyterian ruling elder Chris Hamilton served on the presbytery's hosting team last year. He said, "The visit from Noemí Sánchez had a big impact in several areas from religious studies studients at Eastern Mennonite & James Madison universities, to members of Massanutten Presbyterian. All were blessed with rich conversations about life in El Salvador and how important peacemaking efforts are in that part of the world. I think the group most impacted were the Massanutten youth who listened intently and asked good questions. The folks who provided lodging, meals, and transportation were blessed with discussions and very positive feedback from Noemí."


