Ephesians 5: 8-10

New Monmouth Prayer Blanket Ministry Submitted by Rev. Rachel Clark, New Monmouth Church

Jennie Gaines began crocheting blankets sometime in the 1990's as a way to care for loved ones in the community. She would hear about someone who was sick, and she would take them a blanket as a tangible sign of love. Jennie crocheted all different sorts of patterns and enjoyed being creative and trying new patterns.

The blanket ministry expanded as Jennie learned about the needs of hospice patients and as her own mother went on hospice care in 1995. Through hospice, Jennie learned about "prayer blankets" that were made and blessed with a prayer. So Jennie began to deliver the blankets along with a written prayer for the patient.

When Jennie started experiencing vision problems, crocheting and following patterns became very difficult. Nonetheless, Jennie persevered. She began to buy fleece blankets, and even with her limited vision, was able to crochet a beautiful edge onto the blankets. Due to her vision issues, there are some things that Jennie can no longer do, but making prayer blankets is "something I can do for the Lord," she says.

This ministry has blessed so many people in our community, and it has motivated others to join in as well. Jennie has taught others how to beautifully edge the fleece blankets, and so the love and the comfort continue to spread. The witness and service committee at New Monmouth, inspired by Jennie, has decided to start making quilted prayer blankets.
